CONGRESSIONAL NOTIFICATION TRANSMITTAL LETTER

Consistent with section 7015 of the Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 2024 (Div. F, P.L. 118-47), as carried forward by the Full-Year Continuing Appropriations Act, 2025 (Div. A, P.L. 119-4), and section 34 of the State Department Basic Authorities Act of 1956, the Department is notifying the Committee of its year-end operating plan for the Contributions to International Organizations account.

The enclosed operating plan reflects a total of \$1,576,461,000 for FY 2025, comprised of \$1,543,452,000 in FY 2025 appropriated funds and \$33,009,000 in carryforward. Of the FY 2025 appropriated funds, \$201.8 million was rescinded in the Rescissions Act of 2025 (P.L. 119-28) and \$521 million that was proposed for rescission in the President's special message transmitted on August 28 and is withheld from obligation consistent with the Impoundment Control Act. The total remaining resources of \$854,115,000 will cover assessed contributions to international organizations in accordance with international agreements.

Obligations may be incurred in fifteen calendar days from the above date of notification.

Summary

The Full-Year Continuing Appropriations Act, 2025 (Div. A, P.L. 119-4) (“the FY 2025 Act”) provides \$1,543.5 million for the CIO account for assessed contributions to international organizations. The FY 2025 appropriation amount of \$1,543.5 million plus FY 2024/25 carry-forward funding of \$33 million less \$201.8 million that was rescinded in the Rescissions Act of 2025 (P.L. 119-28) and \$520.5 million that was proposed for rescission in the President’s special message transmitted on August 28, 2025) results in total available FY 2025 resources of \$854.1 million.

These allocations account for any applicable withholding requirements. This FY 2025 year-end operating plan does not include reimbursement of federal, state, and local taxes paid by American citizens working at international organizations. The Department will address this issue in FY2026.

The Department of State plans to carry forward the remaining \$95.7 million of available funding into FY 2026.

Adjustments

As in previous years, when payments occur, the amounts of dollars needed to complete the payments in foreign currencies will vary from current estimates in the table due to exchange rate fluctuations. Upward or downward adjustments in the amount of dollars used to complete the payments in foreign currencies will affect any remaining balance or shortfall in the account. Other minor changes, such as adjustments in the amounts of tax reimbursement claims, may also occur before all final payments are made.
